


Methodology

- A state representative survey of n=500 was fielded online with 18+ year-old members of the general public in each of Michigan, Georgia and Arizona.
- The size of this survey yields a maximum margin of error of +/- 3.1% at a 95% confidence interval, although note that margins of error vary by question and analysis group.
- Minimum quotas were applied by age, gender, education, ethnicity, and past vote.
- Respondents were asked to state their political views on a scale of Very right-wing, Right-wing, Slightly right-wing, Centre, Slightly left-wing, Left-wing.

National Issue Agenda



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The majority of people are most concerned with reducing inflation and gas prices, the main contributors of the cost of living crisis.


Republican voters are more concerned about climate change than election reform.

Following the invasion of Ukraine, there is a desire for the US to become less reliant on other countries for the supply of energy

Preferred policy solutions include increasing domestic production, improving energy security and promoting clean energy innovation.

Energy Attitudes Post Ukraine Invasion

Introduce new measures to cut cost of energy prices including nuclear investment, carbon capture & others



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
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
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Key Climate Change Policies and Messages



Key findings

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Republicans believe climate change is real and support action.

Only 14% of Republican voters believe climate change is not happening.

Attempts to link climate change to unrelated "socialist" goals alienate Republicans.

Yet, surprisingly,
Republicans are
marginally persuaded by
"alarmist" rhetoric even
though this rhetoric is
polarizing.


Republicans strongly support carbon capture, nuclear power and fracking as well as a "technology neutral" and "all of the above" energy strategy.

There is a bipartisan consensus for a "technology neutral" and "all of the above" energy strategy.

Anti-nuclear and antifracking Democrats are out of step with their base, which supports both policies. Voters reject Biden's argument that Putin is to blame for higher gas prices by a margin of 51% to 39%.






Intensity of Climate Change Concern






Level of Concern Over Time





Support for Climate Solutions Candidates




There is general support for climate solution policies in the midterm elections, with slightly more in Michigan and slightly less in Georgia.

Among Republican voters these policies would make them overall slightly more likely to vote for the candidate proposing them, with there being a 3% net likelihood.

Among Total



Support for climate solutions generally declines with age, with younger people much more likely to have their vote influenced by candidates who prioritize climate solutions than older people.




Climate Change Debate Concerns

Government gridlock & inaction in the face of climate risks


Climate alarmism, which some say are arguments hyping or inflating the risks of climate change







Climate Change and "Socialism"




Republicans are less likely to take climate change seriously when it is linked to other social policy goals while Democrats are inclined to take climate change more seriously when it is discussed in the broader social policy agenda.





Impact of "Alarmist" Rhetoric



There is a general agreement that words like "crisis" and "existential threat" make climate change seem like a more serious problem.


The level of this concern doesn't vary much between states, but does vary noticeably between political parties.

These terms are more persuasive for Democrats than Republicans, with a net increase in concern measured at 72% and 5% respectively.



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Popular Climate Goals and Phrases




Energy affordability is the most important climate related goal, further reinforcing the trend in concern for cost of living and rising gas prices.

While the order of importance of different goals is broadly the same between states, it is notable that there is greatest concern for energy independence in Michigan, and in Georgia there is comparatively more importance given to energy security and abundance than in the other states polled.

















Technology Neutral Energy Policy










Republican Party Politics



Key findings

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Donald Trump continues to be generally popular among Republican voters but probably is not a viable general election candidate in 2024.

The "Never Trump" block of Republican voters could be as high as 10%, which would be fatal for Trump's general election campaign The Republican base is more preoccupied with pocketbook issues than Trump. Republican voters say it is more important for a candidate to have plans to reduce gas prices, promote energy independence and defend America from foreign threats than to have Trump's endorsement.

The "big lie" is a liability. A majority of Republican voters (58%) believe Trump's statements about the 2020 election caused the GOP to lose two Senate seats in Georgia and hand control of Congress to Democrats.

More than half of Republican voters believe candidates who claim that the election was stolen should be held accountable (52%). Republican voters face a dilemma. If the election were held today, Trump would be heavily favored to be the Republican nominee but would probably lose in these swing states


The Republican candidate has a plan to reduce inflation & gas prices




The most persuasive argument for voting Republican across all voters would be for a policy to combat cost of living, which corresponds with this being their primary concern.

Overall, it is not persuasive that the candidate has the backing of Donald Trump, although 78% of Republicans are persuaded by this.



Georgia Senate influence




Across the sample it is agreed that Trump's statements about the 2020 election harmed the senate campaigns in Georgia, although this is felt comparatively more strongly in Michigan than in Arizona.

Some Republicans have suggested that President Trump's public statements that the 2020 election was stolen harmed the campaigns of the two Republicans running for Senate for Georgia in 2020, both of whom lost to Democrats, and giving control of Congress to the Democrats.



Georgia Senate Influence (continued)



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
Across the sample it is agreed that Trump's statements about the 2020 election harmed the senate campaigns in Georgia, although this is felt comparatively more strongly in Michigan than in Arizona.

In Georgia itself, 63% of Republicans agree the campaigns were harmed.






"Stolen Election" Accountability



There is broad agreement that those who supported statements about the "stolen" election should be held accountable.


Again, this is most seen in Michigan where there is a more pronounced trend of opinion against Trump.








"Stolen Election" Accountability (continued)



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
Again, this is most seen in Michigan where there is a more pronounced trend of opinion against Trump. 52% of Michigan Republicans believe there should be accountability.





Preference for Trump

Total Prefer Trump: Strongly prefer Trump to be the candidate + Somewhat refer Trump to be the candidate




This response clarifies the trend seen in previous questions that Trump is not supported, and has even less support in Michigan.

However, among Republicans only, there is a preference for Trump, when given the option between him and "another Republican candidate".




2024 Republican Candidate Preference

Climate and Fiscal Policy



Key findings

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More than three-fourths of voters are not willing to pay more than \$10 a month for goods and services that produce fewer greenhouse gas emissions.

Republicans oppose reviving earmarks by a more than 2 to 1 margin (46% to 21%).


Spending offsets
(reducing spending in
lower priority budget
areas) is the most popular
way of financing clean
energy research.

However, lifting or reforming outdated regulations is more popular than any spending option. The least popular option is increasing taxes or borrowing.

Democrats are much more likely to support new mandates than Republicans.



Budget for Goods and Services



On the whole, people are not willing to pay more for goods and services that produce fewer greenhouse gas emissions and are even more reluctant to pay a significant amount more.


53% of Republicans report that they are not willing to pay more, compared with 29% of Democrats.

However, there is little difference between Republicans and Democrats who are willing to pay more than \$100 per month, at 4% and 5% respectively.

Among Total




The proportion of people not willing to pay more for goods and services that produce fewer greenhouse gas emissions increases with age.

This reflects the decrease in support for climate solutions as age increases.



Cost – Emissions Trade Off




There is no real sense of support for policies that mean you have to pay more. This is again consistent with current concerns for the cost of living.

There is a small amount of overall support in Georgia and Michigan, but not in Arizona.

Republicans are less likely to support these policies, and approximately a third of people overall report that it makes no difference to their support.




Support for Reviving Earmarks





Funding Clean Energy Research




There is broad support for clean energy research to be funded through cuts in other parts of the budget and comparatively little support for higher taxes.

Although spending offsets is the preferred policy of both Republicans and Democrats, at 43% and 51% respectively, 41% of Republicans believe research should be funded by the private sector, while only 21% of Democrats believe this to be the case.

International Political Impacts



Key findings



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Russia's invasion of Ukraine has affected attitudes about energy policy. There is strong support for increasing domestic fossil fuel production and clean energy investment and deployment.


Democrats prioritized investments in nuclear energy and expedited deployment of clean energy.

The argument that China should follow the same rules as the US is supported by half the audience but is the least popular strategy for containing China.

Russia's invasion of Ukraine will probably help Republicans and hurt Democrats in the 2022 midterms.




Ukraine Impact on Mid-term Vote





US Response to Banning Russian Oil








Ukraine War Impact on Energy Concern





Ukraine War Impact on Partisan Preference




